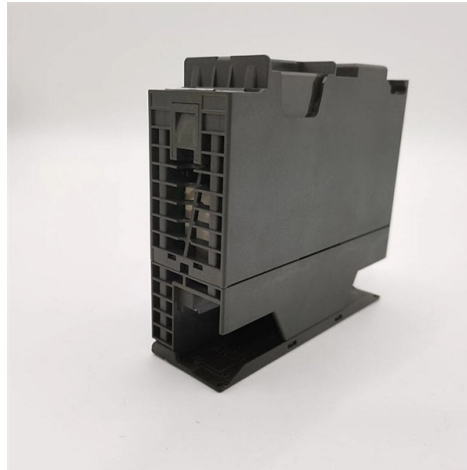


Are supports allowed for cable trays

Properly designed and installed supports ensure compliance with NEC 392, BS EN 61537, and other relevant standards, while maintaining safety, accessibility, and long-term reliability of the cable system .
