Technicians use Personal Fall Arrest Systems, including harnesses, hooks, and lanyards, to prevent falls. The work schedule can include early mornings, weekends, and on-call duties.

Training and Certification To become a tower technician, candidates typically need a high school diploma or GED, with coursework in math, physics, and electronics being beneficial. Training programs at trade schools or specialized centers provide hands-on instruction in tower climbing, rigging, and RF safety, usually lasting 3-6 months. Most employers require industry certifications, including safety credentials and NWSA (National Wireless Safety Alliance) certifications. Entry-level experience often begins with ground crew or supervised climbing roles.

Safety Considerations Tower work involves fall hazards, structural collapse risks, and struck-by hazards. The industry's contracting structure can complicate safety oversight, as multiple subcontractors may be involved. OSHA and the FCC emphasize strict adherence to safety protocols.
