The West Africa Cable System (WACS) is a 14,530 km submarine communications cable connecting South Africa to the United Kingdom along the west coast of Africa, with landing points in countries such as Namibia, the Democratic Republic of Congo, Togo, and the UK, but it does not extend into the Pacific Ocean or reach Tonga. WACS is designed to serve West African nations and Europe, providing high-capacity internet and telecommunications connectivity along that corridor. In contrast, Tonga's international internet connection relies on the Tonga Cable, an 827 km submarine fiber optic cable linking Nuku'alofa, Tonga, to Suva, Fiji. This cable is the primary infrastructure for Tonga's internet access, connecting the archipelago of over 150 islands to the global network. The Tonga Cable is operated by Digicel Tonga and Tonga Communications Corporation and was commissioned in 2013. It is a critical single point of connectivity, as demonstrated when it was damaged by the 2022 Hunga Tonga-Hunga Ha'apai volcanic eruption, temporarily disconnecting Tonga from the global internet.
